



**Glass bead**

This is the best example of an Iron Age 'Meare' bead from the north-east of England. It was perhaps used as part of a woman's necklace in the first century BC



**Large jug**

This was probably made in Gateshead sometime between 1250 and 1325. It had been used to collect water, as it was found at the bottom of the well.



**Buckle**

A bronze belt buckle dating to the 1300s



**Silver penny**

A coin of Edward III, minted at Durham 1351-2, showing the 'long-cross' on the back. In 1351 a master carpenter earned three pence per day



**Silver penny**

A coin minted at Canterbury sometime between 1301 and 1310, showing the bust of Edward I. At this time, a penny could buy a gallon of ale or two dozen eggs



**Silver penny**

A coin showing the crowned head of Henry III, dating to 1242-47.



**Flints**

A selection of flints, evidence of some of the earliest use of the site (10,000-2,000 BC).
